1:30 pm – 2:45 pm Electric Panel – Predicting Electric Transportation and Data Center Loads – What This Means for Infrastructure Investment

This panel will focus on two areas of load that are expected to grow in the near future – electric transportation load and data center load. The Electric Power Research Institute's (ERPI) will discuss its EVs2Scale2030 project and will review the initial EV load roadmaps. A large commercial EV fleet operator and a large data center customer will give a picture of what each thinks the future will hold. And EEI will speak to how utilities are responding to these challenges – leading to a discussion about how we meet this load growth, build what is needed, keep rates affordable and bridge the intergenerational equity gap between when this infrastructure is needed and when revenues will arrive to support the infrastructure.
