Christopher J. Ayers serves as Executive Director of the North Carolina Utilities Commission Public Staff, a position he has held since July 1, 2013. The Public Staff represents the using and consuming public and investigates electric, gas, water, wastewater, and transportation matters before the North Carolina Utilities Commission. Prior to joining the Public Staff, he practiced law in Raleigh, North Carolina with the law firms of Poyner Spruill LLP and Hunton & Williams LLP, focusing on utilities regulation, environmental, regulatory

compliance, zoning and land use, and administrative law.

Mr. Ayers is a past President of the Board of Directors of the National Association of State Utility Consumer Advocates (NASUCA), past Chair of the Financial Research Institute Advisory Board and also serves on the Consumer Advocates for the PJM States Board of Directors, Electric Power Research Institute Advisory Council, Critical Consumer Issues Forum Executive Committee, Keystone Energy Board, New Mexico State University Center for Public Utilities Advisory Council, and is Past Chair of the State Employees Credit Union Board of Directors. He has previously served a two-year term on the North Carolina Environmental Management Commission.

Mr. Ayers earned his undergraduate degree from Duke University and received his Juris Doctor with Honors from the University of North Carolina. He resides in Apex, North Carolina with his wife Rebecca.

Patrick was appointed as Pennsylvania Consumer Advocate by Attorney General Josh Shapiro on December 13, 2021 and was confirmed by the Pennsylvania Senate on June 7, 2022. The Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA) is a state agency that represents the interests of Pennsylvania utility consumers before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, federal regulatory agencies, and state and federal courts. The OCA was created by the Pennsylvania General Assembly in 1976 and is an independent office within the Office of Attorney General.

Immediately prior to his tenure as Consumer Advocate, Patrick served as the Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Legal Aid Network, Inc., (PLAN, Inc.) where he provided strategic leadership and direction to PLAN, Inc.'s activities and oversaw the advocacy, fundraising, and management of the coordinated network of independent legal aid organizations that deliver civil legal aid to low-income Pennsylvanians and victims of domestic violence.

Prior to his role at PLAN, Inc., Patrick was the Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Utility Law Project (PULP), a specialized legal aid office that provides advocacy, training, and representation on energy and utility matters affecting low-income Pennsylvanians. Patrick worked at PULP for 9 years. Patrick also worked as a staff attorney for 5 years at MidPenn Legal Services in Harrisburg where he led their consumer unit and focused on consumer and housing issues, and served as a judicial law clerk to the Hon. Sylvia H. Rambo, United States District Court Judge for the Middle District of Pennsylvania for 3.5 years.

Patrick also frequently serves as an adjunct professor at Messiah University. He received his J.D. from Temple University Beasley School of Law in 2002, and his B.A. from Messiah College (now University) in 1999. Claire Coleman was nominated by Governor Ned Lamont, effective December 3, 2021, to serve as Consumer Counsel for the State of Connecticut. She was confirmed by the Connecticut Senate in March, 2022.

Coleman formerly served as the Undersecretary for Legal Affairs for the Office of Policy and Management (OPM), where she provided legal and policy advice related to the formulation and implementation of public policy for the State and worked with the Governor's legal team and the Attorney General's Office on litigation and legal matters.

Coleman previously worked as an energy attorney at Save the Sound (formerly Connecticut Fund for the Environment), and as counsel to the U.S. House of Representatives Oversight and Government Reform Committee, where she conducted investigations into both private business practices and government programs and regulations, and prepared members of Congress for hearings on many areas of government policy and practice, including energy and environmental regulation. Stephen M. DeFrank
Chairman
Pennsylvania Public Utilities Commission

Stephen M. DeFrank was nominated to serve as Commissioner by Governor Tom Wolf on September 20, 2022, confirmed by the Pennsylvania Senate on October 19, 2022, and soon after elected as Vice Chairman on October 27, 2022. He was appointed as Chairman on August 30, 2023, by Governor Josh Shapiro. His term will expire on April 1, 2025. He brings extensive professional

experience to the Commission, having been employed in both the public and private sectors.

Chairman DeFrank spent 24 years in Pennsylvania state government, primarily in the state Senate where he served in several roles with Senate leadership, including Chief of Staff for two members, Special

Assistant for Policy to the Democratic Leader and Democratic Executive Director of the Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. It was in his capacity as Committee Director where he helped develop policy initiatives and legislation in the utility sector, including modernizing the Public Utility Code relative to energy, water, wastewater and telecommunications. He was a key figure in the enactment of several major legislative accomplishments including the creation of the Distribution System Improvement Charge (DSIC) and the authorization of Transportation Network Companies in the Commonwealth. Chairman DeFrank was also the inaugural Legislative Liaison at the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board during the agency's establishment.

Immediately prior to his tenure at the Commission, he was a principal in the government relations practice of Buchanan, Ingersoll, and Rooney. It was there where he gained an understanding of water and energy delivery from an operational standpoint, while his time at the Senate informed his understanding of utility regulation from a policy standpoint.

The Chairman's priorities at the Commission cover the wide spectrum of utility jurisdictional areas – electric, natural gas, telecommunications and transportation. He is focusing efforts on advancing utilities' roles in transportation electrification; expanding availability and access to both renewable and certified sources of natural gas for utilities; increasing availability of broadband telecommunications services; updating commission transportation licensing procedures; and better accessibility, expansion and retention of consumer affordability assistance programs. His focus is also on the ever-increasing cyber threats that exist to distribution systems and ensuring utilities are prepared to meet those challenges. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in May 2024 appointed Chairman DeFrank to its Federal-State Joint Board on Jurisdictional Separations, which oversees the apportioning of regulated costs between interstate and intrastate jurisdictions. Chairman DeFrank also is a member of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners (NARUC), Co-Vice Chair of the NARUC Committee on Telecommunications, a member of the NARUC Advanced Nuclear State Collaborative, a member of the NARUC Electric Vehicles State Working Group and a board member of the Organization of PJM States (OPSI).

A native of Uniontown, Fayette County, he lives in the Harrisburg area with his wife Colleen and their two daughters Brynn and Paige.

While at ANGA, he helped to lead a multi-million-dollar coalition of member company operatives and consultants to advance the market development and use of natural gas as a transportation fuel, while also providing broader natural gas related policy and lobbying efforts on behalf of the member companies.

Tom's earlier experience was in the Senate as Counsel for the Committee on Environment and Public Works under Ranking Member Jim Inhofe (R-Oklahoma).
